


Solomon Northup: 12 Years a Slave

Customs of Christmas Past

Learn the customs of Christmas from Colonial times through the mid 20th century with the introduction of the Christmas tree to America in 1863.

The Story of Duncan Campbell

Hear the story of Major Duncan Campbell of the Highland Regiment of the Royal Black Watch of Inverawe, Scotland., who was wounded at Carillon during the French and Indian War, later dying in Fort Edward in 1758.

Fort Edward Pottery

Production of Stoneware was a large industry in the upper Hudson Valley. Fort Edward became one of the major stoneware producers during the mid 19th century. Learn about the products made here and how they were used in every American home.

Old Fort House Museum

Built in 1772, the Patt Smyth house is the centerpiece of our 3-acre museum campus.



Tours of this historic home give students the opportunity to learn about life from the colonial period through the 1940s. The Smyth House served as headquarters for both Royal and Continental generals during the Revolutionary War. In 1783, General George Washington dined at the tavern located in this home. The museum's collection also contains artifacts and furnishings that tell the story of life in the Federal and Victorian eras, including the life of one of the house's most famous inhabitants, Solomon Northup. Additionally, the campus has a one room schoolhouse, law office, plank road tollhouse, and water works barn. The Cronkhite Pavilion houses a modern museum exhibit with storyboards depicting local his-

Plants and Medicine: The Doctors Apothecary Garden

The Doctors Apothecary Garden is located on the grounds of the Old Fort House Museum. This living exhibit was designed to educate visitors about the critical importance of plants to the Native Americans and Colonists. This

garden contains more than twenty different species of plants know to be used historically for medicine. Enjoy, in season, tours of this garden as well as an inschool presentation based on historical medicinal



Discovering Historic Sandy Hill

Learn about the history of Sandy Hill, now known as Hudson Falls. This visual history shows several views of beautiful, downtown

The Champlain Canal
